If the mood strikes you, try writing poetry free verse, Haiku, or for the more daring, a Sonnet. If you feel you can't write, find poetry to read by Shakespeare, Walt Whitman, Billy Collins, or the now departed Maya Angelou. I look forward to sharing more poetry in the newsletter and at meetings.

meanings,


I listen to the different voices winding in and out, striving,

Junior Composers Summer Program 2014 • FILM + MUSIC

n July 2014, Junior Composers will feature three programs for composition students ages 14-20.

Junior Composers Studio — July 7-19, 2014 JCS is a two-week experience with extensive instruction in music analysis, theory and ear training. A hallmark of this program is the professional readings of film scores written during the Studio. The composer in residence is Richard Werbowenko of the Twin Cities.

Junior Songwriters Institute — July 13-19, 2014 JSI will feature songwriting and recording experience along with theory and ear training. The hallmark of the Songwriters program is the professional recording through McNally Smith.

Junior Composers Institute — July 13-19, 2014 JCI is a one-week composer-performer camp with daily instruction in theory and ear training. Institute students will conduct and perform each other's pieces and will receive recordings from the final Salon.

Pieces composed during camp will be performed and premiered at the end of the session in Ferguson Hall at the U of M campus.

The theme for this year's summer program is Film + Music. Minnesota Sinfonia will provide professional readings of the students' silent film scores and provide an opportunity to submit a score for the Minnesota Sinfonia contest.

Program enrichments include field trips and guest speakers. Field trips include orchestra concerts and an ice cream social.

Junior Composers is held at the University of Minnesota School of Music, Minneapolis, MN.

The University of Minnesota School of Music is a world-class facility on the banks of the Mississippi River near downtown Minneapolis. Finale and Sibelius music notation software is available for students' use in their technology lab. Middlebrook Hall will house our students, staff, and counselors.

Junior Composers Contest 2014

wenty-nine students lined up at the starting gate of the Minnesota Junior Composers Contest in January. There were three at the National finish line in April. Between January and April, students learned from judges' critiques and nine students earned Gold Cups.

This year's Junior Composers Contest featured varied submissions from 29 students, ages 8-18, in four Classes organized by age. These students were not "running the race" just to win; they were also learning from the experience of submitting their work to a judge for critique and earning points towards Gold Cups.

Abbie Betinis, composer in residence of the Schubert Club since 2005, was this year's judge. She determined a score for each composition and chose the winners from each class. Ms. Betinis gave students encouraging comments to help them build their compositional skills. She judged composed pieces titled Giggles, Dreaming in Moonlight, Within the Morning, Video Game Suite, and Mi Chamocha, to name a few.

Gold Cups

The Cups and Plates have arrived, have been distributed and once again, we can sit back and enjoy the fruits of our labors. We are reminded by students' smiles that these Cups provide incentive.

The Festival program enables our supporting students in various ways. Many teachers enter their students into multiple events. MFMC offers solo events for piano, strings, voice, and band instruments. The Bulletin supports duets, trios, quartets, and concerti of all levels. Students can earn Cups in a second or even a third event.

Our Apple Valley club supports several dates for its Festival program, which allows students to participate in multiple events.

This spring, Mark Twedt assisted us in importing data for an estimated 2,000 Gold Cup entrants into our current access database. By using Excel, we successfully imported data from many sites. We are on our way to building a more complete database.

As Gold Cup Chairman, I ordered a total of 1,096 cups this year for 4,825 Gold Cup participants. In 2013, we had 5,042 Gold Cup participants.

The breakdown: 730 First Cups, 279 Second Cups, 70 Third Cups, 17 Fourth Cups. I want to thank members of the MFMC for their kindness and support during this past year.

Please thank your club's record keepers. They did an amazing job this year. And remember to check out the many events, which are offered in our Bulletin. \approx

Tuition Assistance Grant

he third round of funding grants through MFMC'S Tuition Assistance Grant has begun. More grants will be available this year because the annual amount designated for the TAG program was increased to \$3,500. The maximum grant awarded per applicant is \$500.

The criteria for determining awards:

- One student per teacher
- Financial need described
- Festival participation desired
- Longevity of lessons (student needs to have had at least 1 year of lessons)
- Value of music to the family
- Student potential
- Student's talent and desire
- Character of student/work ethic
- A student may only receive a TAG grant once

Items for the teacher to consider when writing the letter/s of recommendation:

- Are you already giving a discount
- What fee do you normally charge
- How have you become aware of their financial need

If the yearly costs stated on the application are less than \$500, the grant will be adjusted accordingly. The teacher of an applicant must send MFMC a one-page report by June 1, on how the money was spent. The deadline for a TAG grant is July 25. The application is available on the MFMC website under scholarships. \sim

Liability Insurance Deadline

he National Federation of Music Clubs (NFMC) coordinates general liability insurance coverage for approximately 1000 events held annually throughout the United States. Events are insured to protect our state federation at a specific location in the event of a lawsuit. This is a one-million-dollar insurance policy. There are two registration deadlines again this year:

- July 15 for events held September 1 through December 31
- Nov 1 for events held January 1 through August 31.
