We are all in very different situations and we feel it would be unfair to dictate the best way for you to hold your Festival. Deadlines will, of course, still need to be observed."

Parade of American Music – Rebecca Heerdt

American Music Month – Joseph Renville

"The National Federation of Music has declared the month of November as American Music Month. The Professor Rudolf R. A. Schramm Parade of American Music honors its founder, Ada Holding Miller, by encouraging NFMC clubs to increase programming and performance of American music: to bring more recognition to American composers; to stimulate public appreciation and awareness of American music; and to broaden the knowledge of American music. The Parade encompasses all aspects of music and was established in 1987 by the widow of Professor Rudolf R. A. Schramm."

American Music Month will soon be here! In the spirit of recognizing American composers, I would like to showcase a composer from our own area, Joseph Renville. In fact, our own Renville County, Minnesota was named after him.

Joseph Renville (1779-1846) was born near the present St. Paul area. His father, Joseph Renville Sr., was a French fur trader and his mother, Miniyuhe, was a member of the Kaposia band of Dakota (Sioux). He lived with the Dakota until he was ten, at which time he moved with his father to the French Canadian Territory and was placed under the care of a Catholic priest in order to receive an education in Christianity and French. Joseph returned to Minnesota about six years later, after the death of his father.

Because Renville was fluent in both the Sioux and French languages, he was in high demand as an interpreter. He was an officer in the British army during the war of 1812. In 1822 he established the Columbia Fur Company, and after selling it to the American Fur Company of New York, he moved his family to Lac qui Parle (the Lake that Speaks) and established a trading post there. It was surrounded by a stockade, and became known as Fort Renville, where anyone passing through would receive a warm welcome.

In 1835, Renville met Rev. T.S. Williamson, who was looking for a place to begin a mission. Together, he and Renville founded the Lac Qui Parle Sioux Mission. The Gospel of Mark, along with some sections of the Old Testament were translated into the Dakota language by Renville from his own French Bible and dictated to Williamson, and then published in 1837.



The <u>Hymnal Dakota dowanpi kin</u>, published in 1842, was composed by Joseph Renville and sons and the Presbyterian Missionaries of The American Board of Commissioners for Foreign Missions at the Lac qui Parle Mission. It was succeeded by <u>Dakota Odowan</u>, printed with music in 1879, and is still in use today. The most famous of Renville's Hymns is "Lac qui Parle", which is an authentic Dakota melody. It is currently found in many Hymn Books, known as "Many and Great, O God, Are Your Works", and is also a selection in our Federation Festivals Bulletin in Class I Piano Hymns.

As it seems that recitals and music programs may be scarce this year, I would encourage you to have your students research Joseph Renville, Jr. as a way of celebrating American Music Month this November. What I have shared is only a bit of his fascinating life's story, and him also being a composer makes it even more interesting!

Our world, as we know it, pivoted quickly in March. Teachers, students, and parents alike geared up quickly to figure out how to continue learning, using technology.

The North Central Region "Junior Composers Summer Program" was no different and the pivot was impressive. JCSP quickly transformed itself into "Composers Online Institute" or (COI) once it was clear students were not going to be meeting in person. The dedicated team led by Dr. Seth Custer, Randall Davidson, and the board, devoted an amazing amount of time in quickly putting together the first ever virtual composers camp for 20 excited enrollees from all over the region.

I witnessed the fruits of their labor watching videos that had been uploaded to the private *COI YouTube Channel*. It was a pleasure to see the learning in action and relationships being developed remotely. While I was impressed, I realized quickly I had no idea what they were talking about! Jargon like "COI TRACKdrop", "bouncing videos", "DAW", "google drives" being thrown around with ease between teachers and students. It was very humbling and quite entertaining to witness! It was apparent also, that I will need to embrace some of this technology, and study it to support our local festivals and other club events. Our world is changing!

Another project of the NCR is our International Music Camp located in North Dakota. Inperson camp did not take place, but the learning continued. Dedicated instructors who were set to teach at the camp, provided opportunities for on-line lessons for students. These are just a few snapshots of the many pivots which were made in our region and all over our country and were successful because groups came together as a team to support each other. Some of these pivots have been reluctant ones. It is quickly becoming apparent that the future of our organization, NFMC, and of the many local clubs, states, and regions under its umbrella, will be dependent on these pivots. Our students, teachers, and communities depend on these pivots as the arts are vital, not only as economic engines for communities, but also for the important role they play in the education of an ever-increasingly diverse family of students.



These opportunities for study in the arts change lives. I am hoping to strengthen our team effort to support growth in our organization by focusing on our mission statement as an Arts Organization.

There are a lot of people hurting right now in our society, and our region's goal needs to be that we are motivated to look beyond our own needs, focus on the big picture (our mission), and be a force for good. MFMC State Meeting on July 22, 2020

The MFMC Spring State meeting was held on July 22, 2020 via Zoom, due to COVID -19, with 36 people in attendance comprising of Executive Committee, Chairpersons, Club Presidents and Festival Managers.

Full meeting minutes are posted on the MFMC web site – here are some highlights:

Festival Online System – Vivace – MFMC is <u>not</u> moving ahead with any club using the online system until it is completely ready, and our state discusses, at length, the best way to get our data into the system.

Member Support – solicited interest from attendees in pursing the following webinars:

How to host Virtual Festival if necessary (dependent on club location AND situation at the time – it may be possible to hold live festivals)

How to apply for 501c (3) status.

MFMC will no longer serve as a fiscal agent for senior clubs or other entities, and those organizations are encouraged to apply for their own federal and state tax identification numbers, and obtain their own 501c(3) or EIN status through the IRS.
